Family Faces



What You Do

Background: Children love to look at photos of the people in their families. It helps them feel connected to their loved ones during the day and they build expressive language skills as you engage them in conversation about the pictures.

Materials: close-up photos of children's family members

- 1. Collect photos of the faces of each child's family members. You can either take photos at pickup or dropoff time or ask families to bring in photos.
- 2. Sit with a child and look at the photos of his family. "Look, here is a picture of your daddy."
- 3. Talk with the child about the person in each photo. As the child begins naming the people in the photos, build on his vocabulary by adding words and phrases.

"Who do you see in this picture? That's right. It's Mommy. Mommy brought you to school this morning."

YELLOW	Show the child a photo. Expand on the child's words by repeating what she says and adding new words. Encourage the child to imitate the new words that you model. "You see Ernst? Ernst is your big brother. Here is big brother Ernst."

GREEN	Show the child a photo and talk with him about the person in the photo. Encourage him to share more details by asking him questions. "Who do you see in this photo? That's right. It's your grandma. Oh, you like to play games with your grandma? What else do you like to do with her?"
